## EMBRACING THE IN-BETWEEN: THE PAINTINGS OF KEVIN CHIN

The paintings by artist Kevin Chin are not your everyday landscapes, although it might be easy to mistake them as such at first glance. Kevin's choice of medium - oils on Italian linen, a hallmark of Western painting - as well as his use of large scale, meticulous detail, harmonious colour palette and familiar subject matter draw viewers in with the promise of an aesthetically pleasing vista to look at. As a society, we place enormous value on the visual beauty of nature and have appreciated landscape painting as a genre for a very long time. We immediately understand the language of a landscape painting and we expect it to provide an experience of comfort and calm, a sense of wonder, or perhaps even a feeling of the sublime.





Kevin's paintings evoke all of these feelings, but also much more. Upon closer inspection, elements of the subject matter that are familiar to us are not quite as they seem. Horizon lines shift, mountain tops and trees are inverted, skies meld with seas, built structures slip away into oblivion. Pictorial elements are brought together in ways that disrupt our initial comprehension of what we are looking at - a full clothesline draped in front of a mountain range, pumpkins displayed on a shelf with no other man-made elements in sight, a tradesperson upon a ladder in an underground train station in the top left corner of a landscape where the sky "should" be. Although Kevin composes his paintings from fragments of real-world imagery taken during his global travels, they are assembled in a way which results in compositions that are gently but deliberately disorientating.




As Kevin explains, 'One of the first questions I commonly get asked about any painting is, 'Where is this?' One part of the painting might suggest a certain part of the world, whereas another might have strong cultural references from elsewhere. I intentionally bring these conflicting elements together to allude to the complex way we piece together our understanding of where we are in consciousness. Then I'll also throw in elements that are quite changed from the original source image, often regarding colour – as well as sections that are just pure paintwork that make direct reference to the constructed nature of the image. So ultimately, these are places that only truly exist in the imagination.'1

The resulting paintings are reminiscent of dreams, where moments of our lives and experiences are brought together in complex, nuanced and sometimes fantastical ways that can confront and fascinate us. In some paintings, figures are present, and one cannot help but wonder if they know where they are or understand their predicament within the non-sensical landscape they are immersed in. This reflects the contemporary condition of perpetually feeling inbetween places, of wandering throughout the world and the struggle to find a sense of fitting in.

The artist is also influenced by contemporary magic realist literature, a genre which poetically creates worlds that resemble our own but are slightly awry, and uses this as a lens to step outside ourselves and re-examine the way things are in the world. Kevin expands on this idea in his latest series of paintings titled Mystic Meander, which evokes the sense of a parallel dimension - the 'magical feeling you get out in nature that another world could be hiding in the crevices. In my imagination this could be accessed via a portal like the charged zone traversing mountain valleys, passing between twin trees, or following paths that lead to the sky.' <sup>2</sup>

By pushing the boundaries of the landscape painting genre in this way, Kevin asks his audience to consider different perspectives, question the dominant narratives and think about the pressing issues facing our society today. Infused in the detail of his works are clues



of concern about the current state of our world, from climate change, social isolation, globalisation and wealth inequality, to displacement, nationalism and global citizenship. These big issues and injustices, which are so often presented to us in loud, bold and frightening ways laced with anxiety and urgency, are instead alluded to in a gentle, quiet and calm manner that allows the viewer space to not only think, but perhaps more importantly, to feel. Kevin's paintings have a unique ability to simultaneously evoke a sense of both discomfort and comfort, the foreign and the familiar, dream and reality, encouraging us to take a moment to stand in and embrace the in-between.
