William and Winifred Bowness Photography Prize

The prestigious William and Winifred Bowness Photography Prize, highly regarded as one of Australia's most esteemed photography awards, has unveiled its finalists for the much-anticipated 2023 edition. The panel of judges consisting of Rhana Devenport ONZM, the Director of the Art Gallery of South Australia, Adelaide and acclaimed artist Michael Cook, alongside Anouska Phizacklea, Director of MAPh, faced the exhilarating task of selecting 66 artists from a pool of over 640 outstanding submissions.

The selected finalists for the 2023 Bowness Photography Prize exemplify the immense depth of talent present in the contemporary Australian photographic arts scene. Their works, crafted over the past year, offer a diverse and captivating snapshot of the state of photography in Australia today. The exhibition will provide art enthusiasts and the general public with a unique opportunity to witness the extraordinary creativity and innovation prevalent in Australian photography.

The 2023 Bowness Photography Prize exhibition will feature well-established artists like Tamara Dean, Stephen Dupont, Robert Fielding, Murray Fredericks, Ponch Hawkes, Janet Laurence, Danie Mellor, Sonia Payes, Patrick Pound, Yhonnie Scarce, James Tylor, Justine Varga, and Anne Zahalka, as well as emerging artists such as Grace Allen, Madeline Bishop, Mikayla De Pasquale, Yask Desai, Rhy Dyball



and Shelley Horan. With such an impressive lineup, the exhibition promises to be an unmissable event for art lovers, photography enthusiasts, and the broader public.

The Museum of Australian Photography (MAPh) invites everyone to witness the creative vision captured by these finalists, with the exhibition to take place from 21 September until the 12 November 2023.

The excitement will culminate in a special event at the museum on Thursday, 28 September, where one exceptional finalist will be awarded the grand prize of \$30,000 and their work will be added to MAPh's nationally significant collection of Australian photographs.

One finalist will also be honoured with the \$10,000 Wai Tang Commissioning Award, which will coincide with the 2024 Bowness Photography Prize exhibition season. Furthermore, the Smith & Singer People's Choice Award will be determined by public voting, with the recipient receiving \$5,000 in recognition of their outstanding contribution.

The MAPh Foundation recognises the vital role of supporting practicing artists and acknowledges the positive impact the prize money for both the winner and the Smith & Singer People's Choice Award will have on the recipients.

In a heartening gesture of support, Colour Factory, a fine art photographic studio in Melbourne, will be returning as a sponsor of the Honourable Mentions selected by the judges. They will be offering fine art printing vouchers to the three recipients, further encouraging and fostering talent within the photography community.
